The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who:

- are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM)
- are not currently eligible for Free School Meals but have been historically at any time within the last six years;
- have been looked after, via the local authority, continuously for more than six months.

FSM breakdown 2018-19

The school has been awarded funding for 198 pupils (52%) who are on, or have been entitled to FSM in the last 6 years. This is significantly higher than the national average of 24% and is in the highest 20% of schools in the country.

This year St. Dominic's has been awarded £261,360 and in order to best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils in our school we have allocated our funding as follows:

PUPIL PREMIUM ALLOCATION 2017-18

In the academic year 2017-18, the school had 216 pupils (53%) who were on, or had been entitled to, FSM in the previous six years. St. Dominic's was awarded $\mathbf{f267,960}$ and in order to best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils in our school we allocated our funding as follows:
